

**California Clean Energy Workforce Training Program SFP PY 2009-10
Clean Energy Summit–West Sacramento
Questions and Answers**

The questions and answers listed below were taken from the Clean Energy Summit on August 10 (West Sacramento) and were a dialogue between the audience and the panel. Please note this is the actual transcript from the Summit and is very conversational in nature.

Applicant Eligibility

1. Can an agency apply for more than one section? It appears that we were given conflicting information?

An applicant can apply for each of the three categories, one application under each category.

2. Can a lead agency on one application (Category 1 or 2) also be a collaborating partner/subawardee on another application?

Yes, you can be a partner on as many applications as you would like.

Bonus Points

1. There are bonus points for applications who partner with a collaboration of local governments; can you please give an example of what you mean?

Preference points will be given to those applicants that tie their program to a coalition of local governments or a local government that already has a comprehensive retrofit program in place or has a clean energy sector strategy already in place. Those sector strategies or comprehensive retrofit programs are job creation activities, which is why workforce development activities should be tied to them.

Certificate Training

1. What are the correct certifications needed for commercial building auditors? Are any of the certification providers on the ETP list?

The certified agencies and certifications provided in the SFP are examples. The ones highlighted are the ones that we felt provided some of the most comprehensive, robust and accountable programs nationally and in California. If there is another certifying organization that offers an industry-approved certification to individuals, with a similar curriculum, then that would also be acceptable.

Following are additional examples of commercial building auditing designations; however, this is not an exhaustive list. At present, ETP is not funding any training programs for these certifications.

Sustainable Development Professional, Association of Energy Engineers Certified Commissioning Professional, Building Commission Association Certified Energy Auditor, Association of Energy Engineers Commercial Energy Auditor, Energy Audit Institute.

2. For Category 1a, is the certified green building professional training required to be based on Build It Green, or can it be another industry-identified certificate for green building professionals?

The certified agencies and certifications provided in the SFP are examples. The ones highlighted are the ones that we felt provided some of the most comprehensive, robust and accountable programs nationally and in California. If there is another certifying organization that offers an industry-approved certification to individuals, with a similar curriculum, then that would also be acceptable.

General

1. Is nuclear energy an option for these funds?

No.

2. How will the need for water for fuel feedstock be addressed?

It will not be addressed in this solicitation. 3. Are there funds available for job development? We can train a lot of people and have a well-prepared workforce, but are the jobs there or will they be there?

No, the funds under this SFP are not allowable for job development.

4. What is the best way for qualified trainers and material developers to meet up with the subject matter experts who could use such support?

5. Will there be a funding source for clean technology innovators focusing on energy efficient products?

No, not under this SFP. We are focused on workforce development for this SFP. 6. Our wastewater treatment agency has a plan to partner with our local WIB and community college to accept motivated individuals as interns to become certified treatment plant operators. These interns will learn energy efficiency (methane) and water efficiency (recycled water) skills. The SFP has repeated reference to “construction” and installation.” Must this training be focused just on construction or can it focus on “operator certification”?

There is no funding in this SFP for recycled water workforce training. The methane production and use could be funded under the clean energy categories.

7. What is the definition of “region” or “regional focus”?

We have not defined region or regional focus. It will be left up to each applicant at the local level to define what their region and regional focus is using a wide variety of relevant data as support.

8. We are based in Pomona, but have foreign partners in China and the Philippines, will this partnership be allowed? We intend to partner with a community college and university here in Pomona?

This funding is intended to provide training for California’s workers. Partnerships must be local or regional. Hopefully next year, after the successes of this program, the programs, and technologies can be models for other states and countries. Partnerships should be local or regional.

Match

1. Must all applicants have funds to match the entire amount of the proposal? Please expand on this matching activity?

Yes, we are requiring a dollar-for-dollar match. That match can come from WIA funds; if you’re a local investment board you can use your formula money. In-kind or cash matches may also come from other federal, state, philanthropic, employers, or other fund sources.

2. Can we use federal Department of Labor (DOL) funds as matching funds?

Yes, DOL funds may be used as a match. The grant recipient of those funds must write a commitment letter stating that they commit X dollars specifically for this initiative.

Performance Goals

1. Are the performance goals percentages cumulative? Does 81 percent retention mean 81 percent of all participants (even those who didn’t complete training) will retain jobs for six months, or does it mean 81 percent of those placed in unsubsidized employment will retain jobs for 6 months?

The goal is for 81 percent of the participants placed in unsubsidized employment to retain this employment for 6 months.

Proposal Criteria

1. For Category 2a and 2b, are there certain grade levels of math, reading, etc. that you expect after training is completed?

This is up to the applicant to determine for a particular job or occupation. One participant may need 12th grade math skills while others will not. Businesses, particularly those on your Green Employers Council, should inform you what the expectation is in terms of reading and math levels.
